DID YOU KNOW?

The naming of our village Uranquinty began back in 1848 when the Government Gazette reported that “ ‘The Uranquintey Run’ was bounded by the Murrumbidgee River and to the south by Bourkes Creek and next to Mr R. Best’s Run”.

The area was known then as Glenrouth and there was a small school down Churches Plains Road known as the Glenrouth school. John Church renamed his run in 1847 from ‘Churches Plains’ to ‘Uranquinty’ and then to ‘Pomingalarna’ in 1849.

It was reported in the Government gazette 1899 that the Parish was called Uranquinty, which is still spelt the same today. It wasn’t until 1966 that the name of the village was officially recorded as Uranquinty. The local population had referred to the village as ‘Uranquinty’ since the turn of the century.

URANQUINTY PRE SCHOOL NEWS



We are very excited to announce that we have been awarded an Exceeding rating in the following four areas: Educational Program and Practice, Physical Environment, Relationships with Children and Collaborative Partnerships. These were the four areas that we were recently assessed by an officer from the NSW Early Childhood Commission. We would like to thank all our educators, committee, families and children for their contributions and support for our preschool.

This term has been very busy for us. We have welcomed Trish our Resident Artist every Wednesday, to engage the children in creative art experiences. Our focus has been around literacy so the children have made their own stories and puppets based on the story Rosie the Hen. Then the children were supported to draw the dogs from Hairy Maclary using paint/pencils, they made the Stick Man and are currently working on individual collages inspired by the story of Hattie and the Fox.

Uranquinty Power Station Update:

As we wrap up our winter preparations, the team has been focused on executing essential on-site maintenance to keep our systems and equipment operating reliably. This included a targeted overhaul of the GT13 Natural Gas and NOx admission valves, completed between 29 May to 3 June, helping ensure our assets remain in peak condition.

Market Context & Operations

The energy landscape continues to evolve rapidly. With new grid-scale battery storage facilities now operational at Eraring Power Station, the current market dynamics have shifted. As a result, Uranquinty experienced a quieter operating period in the season, recording zero starts during April and just one start in the first half of May.

After this quieter period, the Uranquinty team has stepped up to support the market, operating extended hours in response to increased winter demand, providing reliable generation during peak periods and helping maintain grid stability when it's needed most.

Team Update

We are very pleased to welcome a new member to our operation, Luke Limberg. Luke joined the UPS team as an Electrician on June 8, bringing valuable skills and experience, and we're excited to have him on board.

Looking Ahead

Alongside our focus on winter readiness, we continue to implement new initiatives to enhance safety for staff and visitors and improve station efficiency. This includes looking at practical improvements across the site to support our people and enable reliable and sustainable operations into the future.

URANQUINTY'S FIRST SETTLERS

Our village owes much to the first settlers who arrived in the area in the early to mid 1800s and selected large areas of land to farm, known as squatters.

After the Robertson Land Act of 1861 that sought to subdivide large pastoral properties, major break up of land occurred and people were purchasing properties quicker than they could be surveyed.

One of these early settlers was William Robert Taber who along with his wife Elizabeth and his 5 children, made the arduous trip from Camden by horse and dray, a six week journey.

William selected land on Churches Plains Road and built a farmhouse of pit-sawn timber. The remnants can still be seen, now part of the Army base.

During the next 12 years 5 more children completed their family of 8 sons and 2 daughters, many of them attending the newly built Uranquinty Public School. The older ones attended a small school called Glenrouth (hence the original name for the village).

When the railway was being built, William and his eldest son James had the job of clearing the land on Ruskin's hill (now Kapooka), felling all the trees, attaching chains and dragging all the logs away.

James Edward and his brother William Thomas built two of the first houses in the village. James lived opposite the railway station in Pearson Street and William built 'Gannawarra', a couple of doors from the old Uranquinty hall. Both these houses still stand.

William and his wife Margaret had two daughters Florence and Elizabeth who never married and lived at 'Gannawarra' all their lives. They were staunch supporters of the village and many of the local groups.

James and Charlotte had four children, Elsie, Edward, Muriel and Walter.

Many residents will remember Walter's son Stan who became the best known resident in the village. Stan attended Uranquinty Primary School along with his two sisters Kathleen and Norma. After leaving school, he joined his father share farming, driving horses and clearing land on various farms including the original farm (now also Defence land).

In 1952 he married Isabel Rodham and they built a house on the eastern end of the village which still stands in the middle of the new subdivision on the highway.

In 1965, Stan and his father acquired Esso Petroleum and Australian Fertilizer depot (on the corner of Morgan Street and Yarragundry Street. A few years later, with his father's help Stan and son Kerry began a chaff cutting business, taking his portable steam engine and chaff cutter all over the district until 1994.

Stan had a keen mechanical mind and loved nothing better than working on engines of all descriptions. Many people in the district bought their machinery to him to be worked on especially chaff cutter and steam engine problems.

He was a foundation member of the Uranquinty Fire Brigade, being involved for the next 53 years and holding the position of Captain for 20 years. He became an honorary bushfire control officer in 1968 and trained and encouraged volunteers, held annual inspections of all farm fire fighting units and at one time recruited and trained an all ladies crew.

In 2002 Stan received an Australia Day Achievement award in recognition of his volunteer work over 50 years to the residents of Uranquinty and district. He was an office bearer on the Progress Association, the Uranquinty Hall, the recreation ground Committee and the P&C Association who awarded him life membership for 35 years of service. Later, in 2002 at the opening of the new fire shed, Stan was presented with a long service medal in recognition of 52 years' service to the fire brigade.

Stan was the last of the Taber family to leave the village when he moved to the RSL Remembrance Village in 2006 and remained there until he passed away in 2012.
